

International City Vienna

For the employees of international companies working abroad (expatriates), Vienna is the most livable city in the world. The Mercer Study, which surveys expatriates around the world and voted the city into first place in 2019 for the tenth year in a row. And in 2019, for the second time in a row, the renowned British news magazine "The Economist" chose Vienna as the world's most livable city. This explains why international organizations and leading global corporations feel so at home here. However, Vienna's global significance does not stop at being a HeadquarterCity: it also impresses as a KnowledgeCity, a CongressCity and a "DiverCity". And each of these functions is signaled visually by a striking landmark.

For example, Vienna's Donau City, which is home to major global corporations as well as many UN organizations, is considered the heart of the HeadquarterCity. The United Nations has defined Vienna as one of its four official seats and is represented here with numerous organizations. The IAEA (International Atomic Energy Agency) and OPEC (Petroleum Exporting Countries) also have their headquarters in the city.

In total, international institutions secure over 18,000 jobs in Vienna¹. More than 200 multinational corporations take advantage of Vienna as an ideal location for servicing Central and Eastern Europe. Illustrious Austrian companies such as Wienerberger AG and OMV have also selected Vienna for the head offices of their groups.

The city's high quality of life and safety are reasons why international companies and organizations choose Vienna as a location to do business. The multinational flair contributes to Vienna being highly regarded around the world by congress organizers and participants alike. The conference balance sheet for 2019 records 5,490 congresses and corporate events with a total of 1,581 million overnight stays. In the ranking of the ICCA (International Congress and Convention Association), Vienna can always be found towards the top of the list. In addition to good accessibility and top services for event organizers, CongressCity Wien provides attractive event venues such as the Hofburg Vienna, the Austria Center Vienna and Messe Wien.

Vienna's importance as a city of knowledge is another motive for many organizers to bring their conference to Vienna. With a research ratio of 3.6%², Vienna is one of the leading regions in the EU. Around 46,000 people are employed in the area of research and development. The number of research companies in the city has more than doubled in the past 15 years. And with around 190,000 students, Vienna is the second largest university city after Berlin in the German-speaking countries³. The mdw – University of Music and Performing Arts Vienna is one of the best music universities in the world⁴. Since autumn 2019, the new Central European University has enriched Knowledge City of Vienna with another location. The campus of the Vienna University of Economics and Business,

the Neu Marx Research and Technology Center with the Vienna BioCenter, the campus of Vienna University and Siemens City also supply important impulses in the field of science.

The international character of the city is based on its openness to the world – which in turn finds its foothold in the multicultural composition of Vienna's population. A walk through one of Vienna's markets, such as Naschmarkt, illustrates this as clearly as a look at traditional Viennese cuisine, which encompasses dishes originating from all the countries of the former Danube monarchy and offers delicious proof of the city's cultural diversity. DiverCity Vienna is currently a home and place of employment for people from all parts of the world, around one third of Viennese were born outside Austria and almost 45%⁵ of the 1.9 million residents have a "migrant background" – in other words, both parents were born abroad, with members of the First Generation having been born abroad and members of the Second Generation having been born in Austria⁶.

HEADQUARTERCITY

- Vienna has been one of the four official seats of the United Nations and home to more than a dozen of UN organizations, IAEA and OPEC, OSZE (seat of the secretariat in Vienna since 1995) as well as numerous other international organizations – with around 18,000 employees – for over 40 years (Source: www.bmeia.gv.at/europa-aussenpolitik/wien-als-sitz-internationaler-organisationen/)
- Over 200 international companies have headquarters in Vienna in addition to Austrian companies of global significance (e.g. Wienerberger AG, OMV) (Source: Wien in Zahlen, Wien in Europa 2019)
- 266 international companies settled in Vienna in 2019 (Source: Wien in Zahlen 2020)

- Around 30% of all research expenditure in Austria takes place in Vienna, research ratio (= expenditure on research and development) of Vienna: 3.6% - making the city one of the leading regions in the EU (Source: Wien in Zahlen, Forschung und Entwicklung 2020)
- Around 46,000 people work in Vienna in the field of research (Source: Wien in Zahlen, Forschung und Entwicklung 2020)
- 10 universities, 5 universities of applied science and 6 private universities (Source: www.wien.gv.at/bildung/hochschulen/hochschulen.html)
