

Old masters – young experts

The world's largest Bruegel collection and the prettiest kiss immortalized by Jugendstil (Art Nouveau) genius Gustav Klimt in his world-famous painting can only be found in Vienna. The cultural capital is also a place where you can discover a rich diversity of styles and eras. Baroque opulence and cool avant-garde coexist in an exciting creative environment. Artworks by talented young designers now hang in the ornate staterooms and are just as impressive as the old masterpieces found in Vienna's modern museums.

The Albertina is located in a former Habsburg palace just behind the Vienna State Opera. Important exhibitions are held here and the museum's own collection is also spectacular, featuring names such as Picasso, Monet, Chagall and Renoir. The cornerstone of this is the Batliner Collection, one of the most important collections of classical modernist painting in Europe. The Kunsthistorisches Museum Vienna on the Ringstrasse is devoted to Old Masters. Artworks from every important historical period are on display here, most notably masterpieces dating from the Renaissance and Baroque periods: Rubens, Titian, Rembrandt, Raphael and the world's largest Bruegel collection. The Kammergalerie is one of the most important galleries in the world: it exhibits more than 2,200 objects that were collected over centuries by the Habsburgs.

The Baroque Belvedere Palace is home to the biggest collection of Klimts in the world, including The Kiss. The Secession Building, which was used as an exhibition space by Klimt's secessionist group of artists, awaits at Karlsplatz. While Klimt's world-famous "Beethoven Frieze" can be marveled at on the ground floor, contemporary art is presented in the main exhibition room. The Wien Museum, which reopened in 2023 after several years of renovation, is also located on Karlsplatz and tells the story of the city and its inhabitants using a wide range of objects – documents, models, everyday objects and outstanding works of art. It is the first public museum in Austria to offer free admission to its impressive permanent exhibition.

Renowned 20th century artists are exhibited at the MuseumsQuartier. Built by Baroque architect Fischer von Erlach, the former court stables now make up a whole new district. In addition to the Leopold Museum – which houses the world's largest Schiele collection – the museum of mumok – museum of modern art ludwig foundation vienna (mumok), the Kunsthalle Wien, the Architekturzentrum Wien, the Designforum, stores, cafés and restaurants fill the area with life. The Belvedere 21 near the Upper Belvedere, built in 1958 for the World Expo in Brussels, has been renovated and exhibits Austrian art of the 20th and 21st centuries. The MAK – Museum of Applied Arts presents a diverse collection with a focus on design, applied arts, architecture and contemporary art. Speaking of which, the Albertina modern, a branch of the world-famous Albertina, showcases contemporary art in around 2,500 m² of the Künstlerhaus on Karlsplatz. The most important collection of post-1945 Austrian art, the Essl Collection, forms the foundation of the museum. The Heidi Horten Collection private museum presents excerpts from the spectacular art collection of patron Heidi Goëss-Horten in a renovated palace in the city center.

The Kunst Haus Wien – together with the nearby Hundertwasserhaus – was designed by the famous Viennese artist Friedensreich Hundertwasser in his very unique style. It hosts international exhibitions of contemporary art with a focus on environmental issues. An exhibition space has been dedicated to Viennese Actionism, Austria's most important contribution to 20th century art, in the city center since 2024: the Vienna Actionism Museum.

Numerous galleries, particularly in the 1st and 4th districts, present a wide range of artworks and offer smaller but still impressive exhibitions on their premises. A historic bread factory in the 10th district is now home to more than 15 institutions of contemporary art, including Galerie OstLicht, which together with WestLicht has dedicated itself entirely to photography. The opening of the Foto Arsenal Wien, located at the main railway station, has given Vienna a new exhibition space for photography in 2025.

Young artists also create a buzz about themselves every year in the autumn at the “viennacontemporary” art fair and “Parallel Vienna”, at the gallery festival “curated by”, and in November at “Vienna Art Week”. Art fairs are also held in the spring – for example the SPARK Art Fair. The Foto Wien festival takes place every other year. Local creatives also showcase their work every fall at the “Vienna Design Week”.

A stop in one of the city's traditional coffee houses is highly recommended following a visit to a museum. Take a seat — with any luck it will be a Thonet — and treat yourself. This too is very much a part of Viennese culture. www.vienna.info
